Newsletter Pentecost St Mary's and St Augustine's

Sunday's Readings: Acts 2. 1-21; Psalm 104. 26-end; John 7.37-39

Wednesday's Readings: Psalm 136; Job 3; Roms.2.1-16.

I wonder whether you are a destination person or a person who just appreciates the journey — maybe you are a mixture, or perhaps it depends on how you feel and what day it is. Pentecost to some extent offers us the end of a journey. The ending of the 50 days of Easter with the promised coming of the Holy Spirt — is it the ending or just the beginning? We may be thinking the same about lockdown, is the easing of lockdown the end or the beginning of the process for us? It is certainly a marker on the way, a staging post on the journey. As I believe is Pentecost, a marker for us as pilgrims and a marker for the Church, just as it was for the early Church, 'gathered together in one place' (Acts 2. 1). Pentecost signifies for us the beginning of Ordinary Time within the Church's calendar, we are hankering after ordinary time, something of how things used to be before the pandemic struck.

I was talking this week with a Jewish friend; we were sharing our experiences of lockdown from our different faith communities. She said that during the week she had contacted and spoken to holocaust survivors, now well into their 90's. Her intention was to check on them to make sure they were alright. But as is often the case it was their wisdom and insights that gave her hope and reassurance. Their reflections were that this too would pass and that whilst the lockdown was restrictive, they understood a deeper blessing of a secure and safe home, of food to eat

They displayed a remarkable sense of resilience within the face of adversity because they had lived through something far worse and survived.

We are all, I think now, quite understandably, struggling with the extended restrictions to our lives and wondering what the future may look like, we may be wanting 'all this' to go away, to wake up and discover that it was just a bad dream and everything is as it was ... we are only human. Our Christian faith does help us to navigate this uncertain space, but it does not provide us with a quick fix or a fairy godmother who is going to suddenly wave a magic wand. We may hope that Pentecost will be the answer to our prayers, our longings and that suddenly God's Holy Spirit will

through us, revive your Church with life and power; O Breath of Life, come cleanse, renew us, and fit your Church to meet this hour.

O Breath of Life, come sweeping

As Christian's we are pilgrims and will find that this year Pentecost becomes a way marker for us but that the path remains the same, the land we are walking in will still feel foreign and alien. So, we find that we become marked not by the destination but by the journey we are on.

This Pentecost will not provide for us the fizz and whizz we may have been hoping for. It may appear as if nothing much has changed ... no flash of insight ...no resolution of perplexity but deep down there will be a shifting, a moving, a change, a release ... a fitting of ourselves and Church to meet this hour. Unperceived by the human eye and perhaps even at an unconscious level but a shifting and a renewing, nevertheless. This is the deeper wisdom and truth that will lead

us home. It is that deep well that Jesus offers to us as 'streams of living water' (John7.38). It is the wisdom known and revealed to us by our Jewish elders, the holocaust survivors who now in the 90th year offer us hope and life that we too may endure and know also that this season too will pass.
