Reflection for Sunday

It is easy to feel overwhelmed by the seemingly endless flow of distressing news from around the world. Emotions ranging from anger to despair to sorrow to fear as we witness the ongoing effects of the COVID 19 pandemic, murderous abuses of power, civil unrest and the seeming inability of governments to respond appropriately to all of this. Relationships on all levels seem to be broken – broken relationships between the individual and the state, between people and their governments between nations and between communities. Yet in the midst of all this brokenness are individuals and communities that come together, take a stand and speak out for justice, for truth and for the righting of wrongs.

Restoring broken relationships is the foundation of our faith and the heart of the good news we believe and are commissioned to proclaim.

Loving God,
we seek your presence
in the silence beyond words.
Looking to you for comfort,
strength, protection
and reassurance.
Breathing with gratitude
holding on to hope,
trusting with faith
that you are still God
in the midst of the turmoil,
we pray that your justice
and peace will be found
throughout the earth.

Today is Trinity Sunday and relationship is the very essence of the Trinity. Creative, Life-giving, Dynamic Relationship. The Trinity is not a hierarchy of authority or a convenient role description for its constituent parts. Three-in-one, God in Trinity, is relationship, within God and flowing out to all creation.

Creative, Life-giving, Dynamic Relationship is (at) the heart of God and that same Creative, Life-giving, Dynamic relationship is the gift God offers to us and we in turn are called to share this to "all nations" (Matthew 28v.19) See also Jesus prayer in John 17: 20-26.

Responding to the events in the USA during the week the Archbishops of York and Canterbury quoted Dr Martin Luther King Jnr. "In a real sense, we are all caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Therefore, injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere."

A new and particular understanding of that "network of mutuality" has emerged over these last months in the light of the COVID 19; it has long been recognized as a key truth by environment scientists and activists; it is a Biblical understanding "if one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it." (1 Cor 12 v.26 and again John 17 v.20-26)

The Bible Readings set for today call us to reflect on relationship and networks of mutuality across place and time. Both Old Testament readings are a call to praise "O Lord, our Lord how majestic is your name in all the earth" (Ps 8) but also a call to lift eyes beyond current situations and take an eternal perspective "The Lord is the everlasting God, Creator of the ends of the earth". In the light of these truths, our strength through God, Three-in-One, is renewed and we are enabled to live as messengers (super-spreaders) of grace, love and fellowship/relationship (2 Corintians 13v.14) - not just to one another but to "all nations".
